Introduction

The 25th Summer Deaflympics Tokyo 2025 are being held from 15 to 26 November 2025. This will be the first time the Deaflympics are held in Japan, and it will also mark the centenary of the first Deaflympics held in Paris in 1924.

It is a great honor and pleasure for Tokyo to host the commemorative Games and welcome teams of athletes from countries around the world.

We regard the "TOKYO 2025 DEAFLYMPICS" as the perfect opportunity for expanding the power of sports into new fields. We will not intent for the Games to be just a one-off event. By both of implementing measures aimed at building momentum for holding the Games and spreading Universal Communication, we intend to turn the Games into an opportunity for expanding understanding for the Deaflympics and deaf sports. Furthermore, we intend to create an inclusive society where people recognize and respect each other's differences to enjoy sports together, regardless of disabilities.

To achieve it, we need to invigorate the Games with deaf athletes playing leading roles. The inspiration and excitement generated by athletes' performances; dreams and hopes nurtured through sports; the circle of connection created when a diversity of people come together and combine forces—we are currently preparing to provide the optimum stage for all the athletes to challenge their limits and fully demonstrate their abilities.

We have created this guidebook to provide members of national teams participating in the TOKYO 2025 DEAFLYMPICS with an overview of the Games.

We are grateful to be able to inform you of the publication of the guidebook and are looking forward to meeting you all in Tokyo in 2025.

Vision for the Games

1. Connect people and society through the brilliance and values of deaf sports

- Deaf athletes to be the leading role of the TOKYO 2025 DEAFLYMPICS; to advance its preparations so that the athletes will be able to perform to the peak of their ability. Through the performance of deaf athletes, to communicate and promote the inherent brilliance of sports, along with the attractiveness and values of the Deaflympics and deaf sports.
- To value the diverse perspectives throughout the Games operations, with collaboration by all kind of people including the participation of children.

2. Bridge the TOKYO 2025 DEAFLYMPICS to the world and the future

- Taking the opportunity of TOKYO 2025 DEAFLYMPICS, to advance current promotion and strengthen of access to information and communication including understanding, popularization, and spreading of expressions in sign languages, as well as the development of new communication tools using the digital technologies and their use in society.
- To strengthen the relationships with the world through the initiatives above; people will know more about the attractiveness of Tokyo where everybody can communicate between people with and without disabilities regardless of nationalities.

Realise an inclusive society where "everyone can make the most of their individuality and exert their abilities"

- To further encourage communication between people with and without disabilities, and barrier-free setting in mind-set, information and city environment, by cultivating the understanding of deaf sports and deaf culture as part of the Deaflympics Movement through the TOKYO 2025 DEAFLYMPICS.
- To contribute by the Deaflympics Movement to the development of an inclusive society where everyone recognises and respects mutual differences and can make the most of their individuality and exert their abilities.

Games Emblem

Faculty of Industrial Technology students at the Department of Synthetic Design at Tsukuba University of Technology, the only university in Japan for the hearing impaired or visually impaired, produced multiple design proposals for the emblem, and secondary school students in Tokyo, including those at schools for the deaf, voted for their favourite design.

1.Hand

- The 'hand' is a representative symbol of the deaf community.
- The 'hand' also expresses the desire for people to 'touch' with the competition and topic of the Deaflympics.

3.Flower

- The 'flower' expresses a scene that 'a new flower of the future will bloom' after the 'circle' will expand.
- The motif 'flower' of is cherry blossom petals.



2.Circle

• The 'circle' expresses the idea that after 'touch' the Deaflympics, people will gradually interact with each other and the interaction and community will be connected like a 'circle'

4.Colour

 As many people from all over the world will gather for the Deaflympics, the colours of red, yellow, blue, and green were used to express diversity.

Creator's comment and concept

- I took the theme of a 'circle' to represent the connections between people.
- Using a hand, a symbol representative of the deaf community, my design expresses touching on topics and sports through the Deaflympics, with the hope that mutual exchange and connecting communities like a 'circle' will lead to a new future blossoming like a flower. I used cherry blossom petals as a motif for the flower.
- The emblem was designed to be a single line, which enables it do depict connections between deaf athletes and connections with spectators and children, and also makes it fun for children to draw.

Preparation/Operating Structure

Preparations and operations for ensuring the success of the Tokyo 2025 Deaflympics are being undertaken jointly by three organisations: the Organising Committee of 2025 Summer Deaflympics (within the Japanese Federation of the Deaf), Tokyo Metropolitan Government, and Tokyo Sport Benefits Corporation. These three organisations are establishing an appropriate governance system and building a framework for the Tokyo 2025 Deaflympics that embodies fairness in sport so that the Games are embraced by the people of Tokyo and Japan, and athletes are able to give their very best performances.

Sustainability

In planning and operating the Tokyo 2025 Deaflympics, we aim to realise a sporting event that takes sustainability into consideration.

Sports

Preparation/Operation

To aim for Games where all people work together, build a cooperation system with national sports associations such as National Federations (NF) and national deaf sports federations, and operate the Games upon consultation between all parties.

Assign sports liaison officers for each sport and maintain an operational structure that enables them to collaborate and work together with the sports directors (SD) of the International Committee of Sports for the Deaf (ICSD).

Ascertain the types and number of equipment required for event operation and secure the required equipment (including equipment for providing visual information, such as the starting lights for athletics and swimming, etc).

At competition venues, install scoreboards and other devices for athletes and spectators that enable information to be obtained visually, such as the results of timing, measurement, or judgement. In addition, provide information that enables the competition results to be checked outside of the competition venues, such as on the Games website.

Sporting event entry registration

Sporting event entry registration will be via ICSD.

Pre-registration for team events was accepted in May 2023.

Pre-registration stating the number of athletes entering each sporting event is scheduled for the next registration period, so please submit your pre-registration form to ICSD within the registration period.

Registration period: 15th September - 15th November, 2024

Medical Services

- ■Install first-aid stations at venues to swiftly respond to any injury/sickness that occurs during the period of the Games. Also, transport sick or injured to medical institutions by ambulance or other means when required.
- All medical costs incurred during your stay in Japan are self-pay expenses, including expenses for medical treatment received at the medical institution to which you are transported.
- Depending on your injury or disease symptoms, medical expenses may be high. For this reason, we strongly recommend that you take out private medical insurance that provides adequate coverage and services.

Accommodation

We are preparing accommodation facilities that provide an environment where athletes can concentrate on their sporting events. Reservations will be made via our official travel agency.

- •Travelling time to sporting venues will generally be less than 1 hour.
- •Hotels are classified into 4 price categories and provide accommodation at reasonable prices.

Category A (from 30,000 yen per person per night)

Category B (from 20,000 yen per person per night)

Category C (from 15,000 yen per person per night)

Category D (up to 10,000 yen per person per night)

- *As a general rule, prices include one night's accommodation and breakfast and are the prices per person when the guest room is occupied by the maximum number of guests. Prices may change prior to reservations being accepted due to changes in social conditions.
- We plan for accommodation facilities to provide paid laundry services on request.




